

Command Sergeant Major David Gramins United States Army (Retired)

I first met David Gramins when I was a young Lieutenant Colonel and was assigned as the battalion commander of a tank training unit. Dave was the Command Sergeant Major (CSM). Right away I noticed his outstanding command presence. He had spit-shined boots and a pressed BDU uniform that looked like he had been dipped in starch. And he was handsome, as if he was drawn from central casting. Even more impressive was his complete understanding of the unit, its senior NCO's, and the problems we faced. Clearly, he had studied the unit and our soldiers. I knew I would enjoy working with this man.

That was 1985. I have now known Dave for forty years, and he only disappointed me once. After only a few months with me, he was offered an assignment that was too good to pass up: the CSM of a railroad unit. Dave was not a trained tanker, and he had a hard time accepting that his soldiers were better prepared for the unit's mission than he was. Also, this unit often trained in Hawaii. We offered Ft. McCoy, Wisconsin. See how wise he was?

Years later our paths crossed again, but this time as retired soldiers serving on the Board of Directors of the 84th Division Alumni Association. Dave accepted the challenging duties of Treasurer. Along with his wife Nora, they kept our books for over fifteen years. In light of so many stories we read about board officers cooking the books or outright stealing, "Team Gramins" kept us solvent, out of the papers and out of jail! Dave's reward came just a few weeks ago at our 25th Anniversary Dinner (and the Army's 250th Birthday) when Major General Kelly Dickerson, the Commanding General of the 84th Training Command, presented Dave a 2-star coin for his service. Nora was also recognized and presented with a bouquet of flowers by our Association President Goldie Schuh.

As Board members, I learned that Dave was a golfer. So, with Colonels Bill McKeown and Gary Davis, and a retired First Sergeant named Jim Butler, we joined a golf league. A few years later we lost Bill McKeown to cancer and Dave joined our team. I have played with Dave every week for nearly five years, and I grew to admire and respect him more every week. Never more so than when his health began to fail, and he bravely struggled on. I mention the importance of golf in Dave's life because you tell a lot about a person on the golf course. Golf has been known as "gentleman's" sport (and ladies, as well) meaning the rules of the game are often self-enforced. Without integrity, the game would be a farce. Dave followed the rules of course, and he cleared his throat when he saw a violation that was about to be ignored. He made sure no one in his group would taint the game he loved so much.

In his life Dave Gramins was a volunteer fire fighter, a mail man, a postmaster for a Wisconsin community, a golf course ranger, Commandant of a Drill Sergeant School, and a Command Sergeant Major in several different assignments. You can search long and hard and not find a comparable resume. Above all, everywhere he worked he made it a better place. He accomplished everything with grace, dignity, and honor.

Dave Gramins died on July 1, 2025. Now, two of the finest gentlemen I have ever met, Bill McKeown and Dave Gramins, are reunited once again. I bet they will do "18" every morning and afternoon, in a place where there are no winters, or rainouts, or slow players ahead of them. The game of golf, the U.S. Army, and our country are better, just because he was here. And I am a better man.

Former Railsplitter, Henry Kissinger

The 84th Railsplitters Association was recently contacted about a picture of Henry Kissinger for an upcoming documentary. He was assigned to 335th Inf Regt, 84th Infantry Division. The following is an excerpt from Warfare History Network, WWII History, *Henry Kissinger's World War II*, by Tim Miller, June 2018.



Henry Kissinger, future U.S. Secretary of State, was assigned to Company G, 335th Infantry Regiment, 84th Division while serving in the U.S. Army at Camp Claiborne, Louisiana.

"In November 1944, a young American soldier wrote back to his parents in the Washington Heights neighborhood of Manhattan. Six years earlier, he and his family had fled Germany for the United States, only weeks before Kristallnacht, the infamous Night of Broken Glass.

"Now here he was, having returned to the place where, had they stayed, he and his family may well have already perished. "So I am back where I wanted to be," the young man wrote. "I think of the cruelty and barbarism those people out there in the ruins showed when they were on top. And then I feel proud and happy to be able to enter here as a free American soldier."

"Long before his stint as yet another Harvard intellectual; long before he was thought to be the inspiration for Stanley Kubrick's

Dr. Strangelove; long

before his advisory roles in the Kennedy and Johnson administrations and support for Nelson Rockefeller's bids for the presidency; and long before he became President Richard Nixon's Secretary of State and, by turns, was either one of the most admired men in the country, or condemned as a war criminal—Henry Kissinger was a recent immigrant serving in the United States Army. But it was his experience in the war—without which he may have merely ended up as an accountant—that made him.

"As he later wrote, "High office teaches decision making, not substance. It consumes intellectual capital; it does not create it. Most high officials leave office with the perceptions and insights with which they entered; they learn how to make decisions but not what decisions to make." The man who became so respected or reviled, and who was said to be "musically attuned to history," became so by witnessing history, including the Holocaust, firsthand."

VA Disability and The Army Reserve

Can Army Reservists receive VA Disability benefits? After retiring in 2014 after serving for 34 years, I came to believe that it was possible but exceedingly difficult to obtain benefits to include a VA Disability rating for an injury or illness related specifically to inactive duty training. Over the course of the past couple of years, I have learned that with the right amount of due diligence prior to submitting a claim, an Army Reservist can receive a VA disability rating related to inactive duty training.

Within the last year, I have received VA disability ratings for my foot, leg and shoulder that tied directly to my inactive duty training. Below you will find

the excerpt from the VA related to my claim specifically to preparing for the Army Physical Fitness Test (APFT) that Reservist had to take twice a year, just like those on active duty. As we all know, the same amount of readiness prep is required whether you are on active duty or in preparation for the test on a drill weekend.

Your VA examiner opined that it is at least as likely as not your right foot degenerative arthritis is due to the claimed in-service injury, event, or illness. Your examiner provided the following rationale: Veteran served 34 years in service that required continuous physical activity. Veteran had no issues related to the claimed rt foot degenerative arthritis prior to military service. The current diagnosis of right foot degenerative arthritis/Army is related to the Veteran who served 34 years in service that required continuous physical activity. There is evidence of chronicity, and a nexus has been established. Veteran served 34 years in the service that required continuous physical activity. This repeated stress on the foot more than likely caused this. According to the Mayo Clinic (2021) one of the risk factors for arthritis is repeated stress on the joint. If your job or a sport you play places repetitive stress on a joint, that joint might eventually develop osteoarthritis.

When I retired, I had a 40% disability for injuries received during my deployment in 2010-2011. As you may know, if you are not at least 50% disabled, DFAS takes back the 40% disability from your monthly retirement. I have increased my VA disability since my deployment and subsequent retirement through claims not related to my deployment but my years of Reserve duty.

As with almost all claims not tied to active duty, the VA Regional Offices almost always deny the claim. I have won three higher level appeals (informal telephone conference) for my feet, legs, shoulder and back with the Veterans Administration. I have collaborated with multiple Veterans over the course of the past year, helping them either obtain an initial disability rating or increase their current rating. If you are interested, I would be glad to assist any former member of the 84th Division with a VA claim. 
